

Boards of health are creatures of statute. Their powers are limited to those expressly conferred by state statute or those fairly implied from those expressly granted powers. The General Assembly of the State of Ohio and the Galion Board of Health can develop and administer the policy as developed by the General Assembly. Some of those powers require the Galion City Health Department to "abate and remove all nuisances" and the Galion Board of Health "may make such orders and regulations as are necessary for its own government, for the public health, the prevention or restriction of disease, and the prevention, abatement or suppression of nuisances."

In a statutory form of city government, the mayor serves as the president of the board of health. The city treasurer is the custodian of the health fund and the city auditor shall act as the auditor of the city health district.

The Galion Board of Health is composed of four members appointed by the mayor and confirmed by City Council. One member is appointed by the licensing council (as of this writing– February 7, 2014, this position is open). The term of office for board members is five years.

Division of Nursing

DIVISION OF PUBLIC HEALTH NURSING

The Public Health Nursing division along with the other vital divisions of the health department has strived to promote both the mission and vision of The Galion City Health Department. The public's health and welfare is the priority in promotion of today's health prevention methods. The services offered are coordinated to promote healthy lifestyles and safe behaviors, including education regarding health issues, administering vaccinations to prevent illness, and linking individuals with community providers with equal or similar missions for one's optimum health.

The Health Department was chosen by Ohio Department of Health to participate in a pilot program which we bill the private insurance that covers the child and teen for the routine immunizations. The Center for Disease Control in 2012 ruled they will no longer provide routine childhood vaccines to children/teens whose families have private purchased insurance. The Ohio Department of Health realized this new ruling would be a big change and burden for all health departments who routinely provided vaccines at low cost or no cost depending on insurance or Medicaid status. The Galion City Health Department implemented the billing system supplied by Ohio Department January of 2013, the trial billing program. The billing program has been perfected over the year with most vaccines are easily billed and insurance has covered most or full cost of the privately purchased vaccines. The Health Care Act recommends that vaccines are under preventive health care and most parents do not have to co-pay for the vaccines or visit. The Health Department will continue this billing service after the pilot ends, June 30, 2014. The Ohio Department of Health issued a mandate that child, will needs a Tetanus booster at 7th grade entry, to attend school. Across the nation communities are experiencing an increase in number of infants, children, teens and adults diagnosed with pertussis (whooping cough), a result of decreasing immunity from childhood vaccines or no immunity due to never have vaccines or not receiving correct number of doses. We routinely give a Tetanus Booster (Tdap) vaccine which contains a one time booster dose of pertussis for children over 11years, pregnant mothers, new fathers and anyone not having a booster shot in last 10 years.

The Health Department has contracted with the Galion City Schools and Crestline Exempted Village Schools to provide two nurses for 20 hours a week at each school district. This year we experienced a staffing change, The Galion Board of Health hired Christine Diebler Ruth, RN, she brings a vast knowledge in school nursing resources for the Crestline district. The Board of Health hired Kara Kimerline, BSN RN to provide routine school nursing Galion City School; she has a vast knowledge of infection prevention, critical care and working with teens. Both nurses provide vital links to medical care for all children and adults may need. All the public health nurses will also help the parents with children with medical diagnosis or suspected conditions, up to age 21, via the Bureau for Children with Medical Handicaps BCMH, apply for additional medical services the child may require.

The Galion City Health Department also implemented in 2013 a program on the prevention and diagnosis of Hepatitis C Virus that is spread by contact with blood. The community and nation has seen a rise in new cases of Hepatitis C in adults and children. The main causative factor is the increase of Intravenous Drug Usage and sharing of drug paraphernalia. The nursing staff members are able to provide Free Hepatitis C testing for adults who meet the qualifications set by the Ohio Department of Health.

I briefly reviewed just several of the programs in the nursing division; there are many more programs we provide and we are always searching for new health promotion programs that would be beneficial to the residents of City of Galion.

Environmental Health Highlights - 2013

Significant Events

January 12 - A Norovirus outbreak caused 35 illnesses in residents and staff at Galion long-term care facility

January 23 – A Galion long-term care facility faced utility disconnection due to nonpayment.

March 22 - Food safety in-service was presented to 20 Galion Schools food service employees.

April 26 – Staff began participation in Accreditation Learning Community with colleagues from around the state.

May 2 - Staff participated in Gastro Gambit, a statewide exercise for foodborne illness surveillance and outbreak investigation.

May 7-9 – The retail food establishment program was surveyed by Ohio Department of Agriculture.

June – EH staff began the transition to new software from Ohio Department of Health that moves toward standardization of inspection reporting statewide and will provide information to the public about health department programs.

July 1 – EH staff investigated a case of Listeriosis in a 32-year old Morrow County man that possibly involved Galion food facilities.

August 28 – Galion City Health Department and Galion City Schools co-sponsored food safety training for 42 participants.

December – Galion City Health Department entered into an agreement with Shelby City Health Department for reciprocal field training and evaluation in the food safety program.
